DOROTHEA ERNESTINE PHIFER was born January 19, 1923, to Christine Patterson and Claude Phifer. Dorothea, an only child, spent most of her childhood with her grandparents Graham and Lula Patterson, three uncles, and six aunts. Dorothea, also affectionately called Dot or Dottie, graduated from Davidson High School in North Carolina. Soon after her graduation, Dorothea moved to New York City which was her home for over eight decades.

Dorothea enjoyed a full life in New York. She loved the city and never considered living anywhere else. During World War II, Dot secured employment with General Motors Corporation in New Jersey where she worked for more than 30 years. Dorothea met and married the late Mingo Fobbs in the 1950s.

Although Dot did not have any children, she was a pivotal figure in the lives of her younger cousins in North Carolina, in New York City as well as her neighbors' children, Justin and Brittani Austin. Dot was generous with her time, often babysitting and hosting family.

Dottie was a member of Convent Avenue Baptist Church for many years. Dorothea enjoyed the worship services and attended regularly. She spent time at the Hamilton Grange Senior Center where she enjoyed the comradery and activities at the center.

Dorothea is survived by dozens of cousins as well as close friends who considered her to be family.
