


































### *Obituary*

**DOROTHY HARRIS AIKEN** entered eternal life on Saturday, December 30, 2023. Her spirit is carried on by family and friends from every walk of life.

Dorothy was born on June 22, 1935 in Raymond, Georgia to the late Ophelia (Ferrell) and late Roosevelt Harris. She lived with her family in the Atlanta suburb of College Park before moving to New York City as a young child during the Great Migration. While growing up in Manhattan, she attended P.S. 46, Stitt Junior High School and graduated from Washington Irving High School. During her high school years, Dorothy also ran track for the Police Athletic League (PAL) and won many medals.

After high school, Dorothy held various occupations and briefly attended a nursing program at Bronx Hospital before getting married in October 1954. This union created five beautiful children and lasted 28 years. She was an incredibly loving, nurturing mother who dedicated her life to ensuring her children were kind, compassionate people. She took pride in creating her "Sweet Family" by giving sweet nicknames to all of her children and grandchildren. Dorothy spent most of her adult life as a resident of Westchester County, NY. She was a lover of gospel music, The Nutcracker, ice cream and chocolate. Her home was always open to friends and family who would gather to celebrate Thanksgiving, Christmas and other special occasions. She was a "top chef" and made the most delicious fried chicken, collard greens, macaroni and cheese, sweet potato pie and banana pudding. For Dorothy, cooking was a labor of love - and everyone who visited her home left with their bellies and hearts full.

For most of her life, Dorothy was a faithful member of Bethlehem Church of God Holiness in New York City. She loved to sing and was a member of the Church's Choir. She was also the Founder of the Social, Cultural, Educational program (S.C.E.) - a creative youth church group whose activities included leadership training, educational conferences, cultural trips, and performing plays and musical concerts that Dorothy wrote and directed at the Church.

Since her work with children was so important to her, Dorothy earned her Master's Degree in Human Services from Lincoln University in Pennsylvania in 1985. After graduating, she worked for the NYC Board of Education as a Substance Abuse Prevention Counselor in District 9 in the Bronx. She had a gift for helping young children and made a difference in the lives of thousands of families during her more than 25 years of service. In 2016, Dorothy officially retired from P.S. 28 Mount Hope Centennial School at the age of 81.

Dorothy is survived by her children Adrienne "Sweety," William Jr. "Chip" (Karen), Candice "Candy", Nicole "Sugar" and Sharla "Cookie" (Dwane); grandchildren Cory "Punchy" (Jessica), Amber "Peachy," Harris "Chipper," Maiya Nicole "Angel Cake" and Brielle "My Baby"; sister Evelyn and a host of nieces, nephews, cousins, family and friends too numerous to list but not forgotten. Dorothy is now reunited in eternal life with her mother, father and siblings Elizabeth, Robert Lewis, and Shirley. Dorothy - also known as Mom, MiMom and Mimi - was dearly loved, will truly be missed and will always be remembered as "the lady with the flower in her hair."
