Obituary

FRANCES REGINA SHARPER was one of five sisters born in Harlem, New York to the Erskine Family on November 7, 1924. She attended Julia Richmond High School in Manhattan and later attended CUNY Herbert Lehman College in the Bronx where she graduated at the top of her class with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Anthropology.

Frances went on to pursue a distinguished 30 year civil service career with the New York City Department of Transportation. Frances was one of the first women to hit the streets of New York City as a Meter Maid during the early 1960s. She rose to the rank of two-star chief and retired from the Department of Transportation in the late 1980s. Throughout her career with the Department of Transportation, she taught those she commanded an essential life lesson: “In order to command respect one must first learn how to give respect.”

Frances, a true New Yorker, was a loving, caring, sharing woman who prized her family, friends and community. Upon her retirement, she became more active with the Harlem Democratic Club and Saint Luke’s Episcopal Church. She loved traveling, cooking, bingo, dancing as well as peaceful afternoons at the beach.

Frances Regina Sharper is survived by her beloved son, Spencer A. Burnett and nephews, Robert Sinclair and Jeffrey Jones.
