IRENE DELORES was born on May 9, 1933, the third daughter of Guyanese-born Charles Herman and Irene Alvarez (nee Seely). The family lived in Harlem and the Bronx, NY. Irene's older sister Marjorie rechristened her "Sister," and the name stuck.

Sister was quick-witted; her loyalty, especially to family, knew no limits. She was a visionary and no-nonsense type born ahead of her time, a school secretary who played the stock market and used IRAs as stocking stuffers for her children. She loved justice, her grandmother Dixie, word play, sweets, the Anglican form of worship, and beauty.

In 1954, Irene met Leonard Wesley McKenzie, a dashing young service man from Jamaica, WI. The couple married in 1956 and later welcomed two children, Leonard and Caroline. The visionary Irene convinced Leonard, to buy two lots of swampland in West Cape May, NJ and move a decommissioned Coast Guard barracks onto the property. Until their mid-teens, her children never knew a summer in the city. But West Cape May, and Sister herself, were more than a resort for the McKenzies. They were refuge for younger family members in rough family circumstances, whom Irene and Leonard welcomed as their own.

As a youngster, Irene wanted more than anything to attend college. She had graduated with honors from Walton High School and hoped to work in the business sector. Though accepted to Baruch College, she would defer her education at least two decades while she worked to contribute to her parents' home, married, and raised her two children.

Irene joined the Board of Education as a records secretary at seventeen. Forty-one years later, she retired from Taft High School as a business education teacher and department administrator. Inquisitive and resourceful, Irene taught herself Microsoft Office and a few computer languages, then introduced them to her classroom. She insisted that her students broaden their experiences, and organized field trips to Rockefeller Center and Wall Street. For many, the trips marked their first time out of the Bronx. Several of Irene's students kept in touch with her, corresponding with her and occasionally visiting her home until 2018, when Irene entered memory care.

For at least a decade, Irene lived through Alzheimer's with dignity. She was loved abundantly by those who could see her through the last stages. Her children are especially grateful to the staff at Sunrise of Crestwood, who adopted Irene as their "Grandma Grandma." Irene died peacefully at Sunrise on November 23, 2023, surrounded by new and old family members.

Irene is survived by Leonard and Caroline, their spouses, Michael Taurisano and Kenneth Robinson; Sheryl Tyson Capps and Arnold Lewis, the niece and nephew who call her "Sis," and treat her as mother; and a host of nieces, nephews, grandnieces, grandnephews, and godchildren.
