

Keith Grayson, p.k.a. DJ Kay Slay, was born August 14, 1966 in New York City and raised in East Harlem. As a child, he was drawn to disco, dancing the Hustle; when early Hip-Hop DJs began turning breakbeats from those songs into protorap music; he traveled to the Bronx to observe and participate in the rising culture. Keith would hop on the six trains and go up to the Bronx River Center to see Afrika Bambaataa and the Zulu Nation rock. Keith took up the affiliated art forms of breakdancing and graffiti, even casually rapping with his friends, mastering every element of Hip Hop culture. Street art became his chief passion, first under the tag Spade 429 and later Dez TFA, which he shortened to Dez.

Amid the city's crackdown on graffiti, Dez took on the name Kay Slay and developed a fascination with turntables. In 1989, after serving a brief stint of incarceration, Keith found solace in the Nation of Gods & Earths and fully immersed himself into his craft of performing as a DJ and releasing exclusive mixtapes. DJ Kay Slay secured his first multi-million-dollar record contract with Columbia Records and released his debut album, The Streetsweeper, Vol. I, on 20 May 2003. In the summer of 2003, Kay Slay released a single, accompanied by a music video, for a song titled "Too Much For Me." The single, which features a chorus sung by then-up-and-coming singer Amerie, also features verses from American rappers Birdman, Nas and Foxy Brown. The song peaked at number 53 on the US Billboard Hot R&B/Hip-Hop Songs chart, making it the DJ's highest-charting single to date. Kay Slay would later go on to release dozens of albums, music projects, videos, and guest appearances culminating in his Magnus opus, Rolling 110 Deep, recruiting 110 of the most iconic and influential emcees that have framed Hip Hop. Kay Slay featured as an on-air radio personality at the world-famous Hot 97 held the number one rated show called the "Drama Hour" for over 20 years, helping shape what Hot 97 is today. Kay Slay also hosted Streetsweeper radio on Shade 45 Sirius XM Radio. Kay Slay founded the longest-running urban print Straight Stuntin Magazine and was a consummate business owner, hustler, and entrepreneur.

D Kay Slay served as a crucial bridge between hip-hop generations, developing from a teenage B-boy and graffiti artist into an innovative New York radio personality. He was known for his exclusive mixtapes that stoked rap battle, broke artists, and helped change the music business forever. We will never again see a man of such character and magnitude.

Keith is survived by his dear mother, the honorable Sheila Grayson, brothers Kwame and Michael Grayson, Great Aunt Albertha Middleton, Aunt Carolyn Green, Aunt Elaine Simmons, Uncle Ronald Jenkins, Uncle Kevin Wiley, Uncle Waverly Green, Cousins Tasha Green, Sean Green, Jameik Simmons, Cousin Shantay Bueford, his partner Shea Robinson, Special Friend Joshua White, protege and Brother in-kind Papoose, Special Friend Big Gene, # I Fan Travis Woody, Half Brother Reggie Jones AKA Smoke 106, Childhood Friend Timothy Brown, Special Friend Charlie Moe, a host of cousins, family, Business Manager and Brother in-kind Jarrod Whitaker, and a legion of friends, family, fans, supporters, and Hip Hop Culture itself.
