LUDWIC CLINTON BROWN, whose personal preference is to be referred to as Clinton, or in Harlem, Junior, was born on August 12, 1943 in the Village of Harlem to Ludwic W. Brown and Leila Evelyn Snowden Brown. He was the fifth of this couple's six children.

He, like his siblings, was a deeply rooted New York City youngster who was raised in a brownstone (better known as 240) on a tree-lined street that bordered the famous Sugar Hill area and where the "stoop" was transformed into the convention center – winter, spring, summer and fall.

Clinton also had an eclectic taste in music mostly enjoying jazz and Motown, listening to it whenever he could.

Clinton was the definition of cool and class; never with anything out of place or out of order, and always a source of wisdom or advice, also a protector. Those characteristics drew the notice of those that came in contact with him. Some would say a role model but he thought it was just him being him. He always greeted friends with a smile and the phrase of "Hey how are you doing?" He always replied "I am good!" before being asked.

Clinton's mentoring and fathering ways went further than the threshold of his home. He became the father figure to those that needed it, Derrick, Corey and their band of brothers. Always there, always available whether it was what to tell your significant other, how to hold a drill, or what washer was needed to fix a sink; he was always ready to give his knowledge.

Clinton was blessed when he became a grandfather. He adored his two grandchildren, Andre born April 12, 2004, and Amaya born May 24, 2008 and the love and closeness between them and Grandpa "B" was obvious. They gave him the spirit and drive to push on and live life after the passing of Eleanor. He loved spending Christmas with them and waking up with them to open gifts. Playing Santa with Derrick putting together toys made his year.

Clinton and Derrick had a special bond way beyond father and son. He loved the fact that they were friends. The choices in Derrick's partners and friends meant the world to him. He thought the world of his daughter-in-law, Nicole, and always sang her praises as a wife to his son, mother to her children, and a no-nonsense adviser to him.

Clinton was preceded in death by his his loving wife Eleanor Brown, siblings Joan and Toby Snowden.
