RHODA WYNN WELLS was born in Atlanta, Georgia on July 10, 1927. She grew up in the same neighborhood and attended elementary school with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. She attended Morris Brown College, part of the Atlanta University Center, a Historical Black College and University, which included Spelman, Morehouse and Clark College, and was part of the college marching band as a majorette. She graduated in the same era that many great black Americans whose contribution to history and the world is indelibly etched into our conscience to this day.

Rhoda was that special blend of woman, not only brains, but blessed with beauty, but too modest to use to her advantage, but was approached by a local photographer, who steered her into part time modeling. Her confidence grew and she became a very stylish woman about town, and would encourage other women who looked to her, like an early influencer, "...have a few simple nice things to fit your personality".

Rhoda moved to New York City in the early 1950's and worked at Harlem Hospital. She joined Abyssinian Baptist Church and was a member until her last days. She enjoyed her independence and was part of the many burgeoning Civil Rights organizations of the day, then later married Dr. William Pleasants in 1957, moving to St. Albans, Queens and was blessed with two sons, William in 1958 and Stephen in 1959. She was a doting mother, and happily raised her children full time, ensuring they had as many opportunities that life had to offer.

Rhoda was an avid golfer; she played from the 1960s where few black women were represented, but excelled at it, winning numerous trophies at local tournaments.

Rhoda remarried in 1976 to Dr. Aaron Otis Wells, and gained a stepdaughter, Suzanne Monique Wells. They resided at West 88th St. in Manhattan, where they both spent their remaining years. Rhoda was an exceptional hostess; she was a great cook and storyteller. She welcomed everyone to their home, and when you entered, you were embraced physically and spiritually, you were loved.

She was preceded in death by her beloved husband, Dr. Aaron Otis Wells and her son Stephen Pleasants. She is survived by her son, William "Bill" Pleasants, stepdaughter, Suzanne Monique Wells and daughter-in-law, Susan Malcolm Pleasants.

To her dying day, people praised her for her dignity, manners, style, and class. She was truly a gem. She will be missed and remembered.
